
Robert Guest is an outstanding writer and speaker on world affairs and business.

- Based in London, Robert Guest is the Foreign Editor of The Economist, covering strategic affairs in Europe, the USA, and the emerging markets.
- He was formerly in charge of coverage of the USA for *The Economist* magazine as US Editor and before that the newspapers' Business Editor.

- His articles include: The magic of diasporas, a 2011 cover story for The Economist about migration and business; Surviving the slump, a 2009 special report on business in America; and The road to hell is unpaved, an account of the time he hitched a ride on a beer truck in West Africa. He has won numerous awards.
- Robert is regularly invited to participate in radio and TV programmes, including guest-hosting CNBC's morning show and appearing on NPR, BBC Radio 4's *Today* programme, BBC World's *Global Business*, Sky News and others.
